

New York General Election Results

New York's General Election was held on Tuesday, November 5, with early voting beginning Saturday, October 26. All 435 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives are up for election in November, including the 26 across New York state – several of which featured competitive races. All 150 State Assembly and 63 State Senate seats were up for reelection this year too, as well as one of the New York's two seats in the U.S. Senate. Our review of the election results in New York's Congressional and state legislative races follows.

Earlier this year, 17 state legislators had announced that they would not seek reelection this fall. Several are running for a higher office, and the rest retiring from public service. Several very senior leadership and committee chair positions will be open (e.g. Assembly Speaker Pro Tem, Assembly Ways & Means Committee chair), and be filled by Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie early in 2025.

Please note all election results listed below include early vote totals, Election Day votes, as well as any absentee ballots that were received by the local board of elections and canvassed (counted). Recent changes to the Election Law now require the canvassing of absentee ballots on a rolling basis beginning within 4 days of receipt. On or after Election Day, the canvass will be conducted within one day of receipt of a ballot or cure and continues daily until completed. The Boards of Election will canvass Affidavit Ballots four business days after Election Day.

Due to the rolling canvass of absentee and early voting reflected in election night results, the vote totals from Election Night are more likely to reflect the final outcome of the election than in years past. Despite this, all outcomes are still dependent on the final canvassing of all ballots and the results listed below are current as of this writing, while the Board of Elections canvassing process continues.

The outcomes in certain New York races differ somewhat from the trend seen elsewhere in the U.S. on Election Day. Democrats have “flipped” three seats in the House of Representatives, winning districts currently represented by Republicans. These wins will likely factor into which party controls the U.S. House in January. Conversely, there appear to be at least two seats in the State Assembly and Senate where Republicans have won seats currently held by Democrats.

John Avlon (D) is an American journalist, political commentator, and Democratic political candidate. He is a senior political analyst and anchor at CNN and was the editor-in-chief and managing director of The Daily Beast from 2013 to 2018.

Nick Lalota (R) graduated from the United States Naval Academy. He served in the U.S. Navy for eight years, serving three overseas deployments. He earned a Master of Business Administration and a Juris Doctor from Hofstra University. LaLota served as chief of staff to Suffolk County presiding officer Kevin McCaffrey. He also served on the Suffolk Board of Elections as well as a trustee for the village of Amityville, New York. Lalota was first elected to congress in 2022.

General Election:



Tom Suozzi (D) is a member of the U.S. House, representing New York's 3rd Congressional District. He assumed office for a second time on February 28, 2024. On November 29, 2021 Suozzi announced that he would not seek re-election in the United States House of Representatives and instead would run for Governor of New York. After losing to Governor Hochul in a primary, he ran in a special election to re-take his former seat, vacated by George Santos. Prior to his election to the U.S. House, Suozzi served as the county executive of Nassau County from 2002 to 2009. He was the mayor of Glen Cove, New York, from 1994 to 2001.

Mike LiPetri Jr. (R) is running for election to the U.S. House to represent New York's 3rd Congressional District. LiPetri was a member of the New York State Assembly, representing District 9. He assumed office on January 1, 2019. He left office on January 1, 2021.

Laura Gillen (D) is running for election to the U.S. House to represent New York's 4th Congressional District. This race is a rematch of 2022, when D'Esposito defeated Gillen 51.8%-48.2%. Gillen graduated from Georgetown University and later earned a degree from New York University's School of Law. She was the Hempstead Town Supervisor from 2018 to 2020. She has worked as an attorney and as an adjunct law professor at Hofstra University.

Anthony D'Esposito (R) is a member of the U.S. House, representing New York's 4th Congressional District. He assumed office on January 3, 2023. D'Esposito graduated from Chaminade High School in 2000. D'Esposito earned a B.A. in English language and literature from Hofstra University in 2004. His career experience includes working as a detective with the New York City Police Department and the chief of the Island Park Fire Department. This race is a rematch of 2022, when D'Esposito defeated Gillen 51.8%-48.2%.

Jones' career experience includes working with the U.S. Department of Justice Office of Legal Policy, with Davis Polk & Wardwell LLP, and as an attorney with the Westchester County Law Department. Jones previously served in Congress.

Michael Lawler (R) is a member of the U.S. House, representing New York's 17th Congressional District. He assumed office on January 3, 2023. Lawler was born in Suffern, New York, and lives in Pearl River, New York. Lawler graduated from Suffern Senior High School in 2005. He earned a bachelor's degree from Manhattan College in 2009.

Ryan earned a B.S. in international politics from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in 2004 and an M.A. in security studies from Georgetown University in 2013.

Currently, Ms. Keiserman works as a freelance consultant, developing curricula and educational tools that foster respect for religious and cultural differences.

Jack Martins (R) is a member of the New York State Senate, representing District 7. He assumed office in the State Senate for second time on January 1, 2023. He previously served in the Senate before leaving to pursue an unsuccessful campaign for Congress. Martins graduated from Chaminade High School. 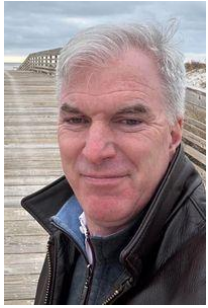

Iwen Chu (D) is a member of the New York State Senate, representing District 17. She assumed office on January 1, 2023. Chu is the first Asian American woman to serve in the State Senate. Chu should be favored to win this Brooklyn district, though, recent presidential, gubernatorial, and mayoral races have shown an ability to vote Republican in higher numbers than one might expect. A similar seat was held by Marty Golden (R) for many years.

Steve Chan (R) is running for election to the New York State Senate to represent District 17. Chan was born in Hong Kong. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1984 to 1990. He earned a high school diploma from Fort Hamilton High School. Chan is a political newcomer and is likely to need to ride larger than expected coattails to win.

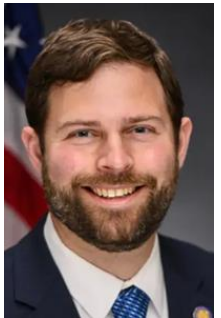

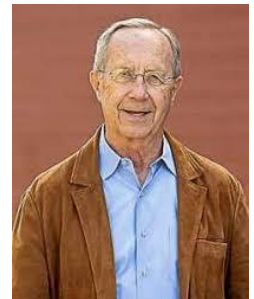

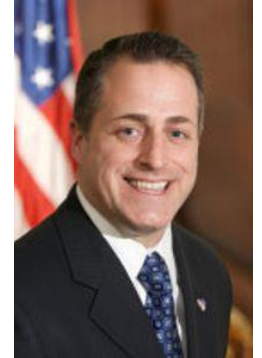
